A word from the Executive Directors

This time last year HomePlace had just celebrated its 30th Anniversary with a dinner as part of our AGM and we danced the night away. We were not to know how much the world would change this year. At this year's AGM held in October, sadly we had no dancing and had to follow strict COVID rules. Despite the restrictions it was a great evening and a chance for us all to catch up.

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The recent COVID-19 outbreak in South Australia reminds us that the virus is still around, and that we can't become complacent. We must strictly maintain the hygiene, social distancing and service delivery practices we have in place for some time to come.

The Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability continues its work and have just released an Interim Report. We are looking with great interest at the information in the report related to group homes, more information is contained within this newsletter related to group homes.

Several HomePlace participants are making direct presentations to Commissioner Dr Rhonda Galbally on their experiences with service systems. The participants are supported by Our Voice and it is pleasing that the Dr Galbally has made time of half a day for each participant. This demonstrates the commitment of the Royal Commission to hear the voices of people with an intellectual disability.

Christmas is almost here, and although we had plans for a lovely get together on Friday 4th December, this event has now been postponed due to the recent COVID-19 outbreak in South Australia. We will look to create another opportunity to celebrate early in the new year as restrictions are eased. Until then, stay safe, stay well and stay home.

Senior Australian of the Year for 2021 (SA) **HomePlace Patron Richard Bruggemann**

Many congratulations to HomePlace Patron, Professor Richard Bruggemann who has been named Senior Australian of the Year (South Australia) for 2021. We are so very proud of him!

At 76 years old, Professor Richard Bruggemann is continuing to make a difference to the lives of people living with an intellectual disability.

Throughout his career, he has provided expert advice to governments on disability services, legislation, inclusion, and rights. He is a dedicated volunteer, has sat on more than 20 non-government boards and committees, and is a prolific writer on topics of concern for the disability community.

This year, he was called on by the South Australian Government to join the special taskforce investigating the tragic death of cerebral palsy sufferer, Ann Marie Smith.

Richard was also appointed to a new government role to assess the temporary orders to protect people living with a cognitive or mental impairment from the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

His ongoing leadership has helped create a community service system that helps people with intellectual disability and their families enjoy a better quality of life.
